WHO ARE YOU?

You love challenges, thrive in collaborative environments, and balance the gravity and joy of working in a boarding school. You seek a deeply relational and intentionally small community where you will be encouraged and supported to bring your full self to all aspects of your work.

- Be able to teach a range of Spanish offerings from Spanish I through V
- Put the study of Spanish both in historical and social context
- Have a sense of humor and a high degree of flexibility
